Dangers of Letting A Cat Outside

Did you know that the lifespan of outdoor cats is shortened by 3-5 years compared to indoor cats? Every time cats go outside, their lives are put at risk.

• They Can Get Hit by a Car

You might think that this applies only to busy roads, but you don't need to live near a highway for your cat to run the risk of getting hit by a car whenever it crosses the street. Some people argue that their cats know about street safety and are aware of cars around them, but it only takes one mistake for a cat to get run over. Don't assume that the driver will see your cat or that your cat is smart enough to avoid traffic.

Other Animals Can Hurt Your Cats

Cats are in danger of being hurt or killed by other animals. Depending on where you live, there are a variety of wild animals that could hurt or kill a cat, such as coyotes, wolves, foxes, hawks and owls. Your cat also runs the risk of being attacked by dogs and even other

Diseases and Health Issues

A cat can get sick from going outside and coming in contact with other cats. Feline Immunodeficiency Virus (FIV) is the feline equivalent of HIV in humans, and is spread through bites by infected cats. A cat with FIV has a compromised immune system and is more susceptible to other illnesses. Feline Leukemia Virus (FeLV) is another serious illness that infected cats can transmit to healthy cats through the transfer of saliva or nasal secretions. By going outside, cats also run the risk of getting rabies, parasites such as fleas, ticks, lungworms and tapeworms, and funguses such has ringworm.

Some People Don't Like Cats

There are many people who just don't like cats, and some will try to hurt them if given the chance. It is heartbreaking to lose a cat, but so much worse if someone intentionally kills it. When you let your cat outside, you put it at the mercy of cruel individuals.

Cats Can Get Lost or Trapped

Sometimes cats don't return home because they have lost their way or gotten trapped in a garage, basement or shed, or up a tree. Not all cats have great directional skills, and there are no guarantees that they will return if they wander too far from home. If not discovered quickly, the results can be deadly.

Cats are Decimating Bird Populations

It is no secret that cats are small predators who enjoy hunting and killing. Even a well fed cat will prey on birds and other animals for sport. It is estimated that approximately 1-4 billion birds are killed by cats every year in the United States, and it is no wonder that environmentalists are concerned about the impact that domestic cats have on ecosystems.

Cats Could Unintentionally Be Poisoned

Cats outside are exposed to a variety of substances, some of them deadly. Antifreeze is a real danger because cats are attracted to the taste and smell. Ingesting it can cause kidney failure and death. Other harmful substances include pesticides, chemicals and poisonous plants.

Thank you, Joel School, for all you do to help us!








